"Spent" hens suffer after 8 hours without food, water and rest in trucks

# Government's Canadian Food Inspection Agency said:

12 hours is allowable

## **Industry said:**

24 hours

Industry won.









Under draft regulations, cows may be transported 36 hours without water, food or rest — 22% longer than EU and New Zealand cows.



Pigs die in the trucks from heat, cold and stress. Handlers cut boars' sensitive tusks without anesthetic to curb aggression — partitions are an obvious solution instead.

Uncovered Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) emails reveal that in 17.4% of shipments, 4% or more of the spent hens arrived dead.

In one truckload, 51.59% died. Often featherless after being caged for a year, they die from heat, cold and injuries.

Today's animal transport guidelines are 39 years old and badly outdated. New draft regulations — Health of Animals Regulations, Part XII (animal transport) — are available for public comment until this Wednesday, February 15<sup>th</sup>.
